She can't catch, but she can throw.

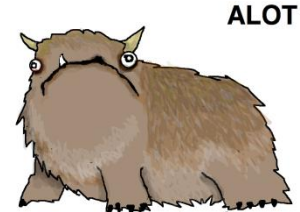
A lot, not alot.
